CAREERS Meets the Needs of Young Adults

When you think of CAREERS, you probably think of the hundreds of adults we place and support in jobs each year. However, a growing segment of our clients are high school students looking to ease the transition from high school to the world of employment. CAREERS has responded to this need with a number of new programs to help bridge the gap from graduation to the workplace (see "Ambition In Motion" article on page 2).

Many school districts are being stretched beyond their resources to provide the mandated services required by New York State to ensure that all students meet the new graduation requirements. In response to the new Career Development and Occupational Studies (CDOS) curriculum, CAREERS is currently collaborating with school districts throughout Westchester and Putnam Counties to provide the following services:

For Students:

- Career exploration, work readiness & financial skills training through a weekly classroom curriculum
- Community internships
- Assistance with applications to New York State ACCES-VR
- Job development, placement, on-the-job training and follow-along services
- Advocacy, referral and resources for a successful transition from school to work

For School Districts:

- Job Coach training seminars for school personnel
- Job development, placement & worksite support for students and Teacher's Assts.
- Attendance and participation at CSE meetings
- Unique and motivating classroom activities in career exploration, job development skills, mock interviews, resume and cover letter preparation

CAREERS offers services to students through private contracts with their home district. We provide professional support to district staff and equip students with the skills needed to secure the right job. Our experience in job placement and training provides exceptional insights to help students develop the skills necessary for a lifetime of successful employment.

We have had great success with our **Project Search** program with New Rochelle High School and are currently negotiating with other school districts to provide this intensive

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

AIM - AMBITION IN MOTION A DAY HABILITATION PROGRAM WITHOUT WALLS

If you've seen a Ford Flex filled with recyclables cruising around Putnam County, it's probably CAREERS' AIM team, working on one of the community projects that the group has taken on since its inception in September. Participants in our day habilitation program without walls are learning the life skills they need while enjoying volunteer and recreational activities.

The program was created to provide a stepping stone for individuals to move from a traditional day habilitation setting to a person-centered approach where they learn to interact with their environment. Participants are taught workforce readiness skills and encouraged to take an active role in the world around them. It is tailored to the abilities of each participant and creates opportunities for individuals with disabilities, who do not have the skills to participate in a supported employment program, to interact and contribute to the local community at whatever level they can. This unique concept provides a sense of independence and self-reliance through diverse experiences.



Participants are regulars in area food stores and recreation centers. They have learned how to navigate laundromats and libraries and have favorite shelter animals and deli specials. Then there's the garden plot in the Tilly Foster Garden that our AIM group can't wait to dig into!



Whether it is shredding or mailing documents, cooking lunch or cleaning the office, AIM participants have a full day of worthwhile activities, with the added benefit of socialization with new friends and the community in which they live.
